# Phonics Screening Check 2020-2021









#### **The Phonics Screening Check**

 The National Phonics Screening Check is a statutory assessment that was introduced in 2012 to all Year 1 pupils.


• All year 1 pupils should take the phonics screening check in June but because of COVID 19, your child did not take this check. It has now been rescheduled for Autumn 2 this year (between October half term and Christmas).

 It comprises of a list of 40 words; 20 real words and 20 nonsense words.

### **Phonics Screening Check**

- It will assess phonics skills and knowledge learnt through reception and year 1.
- Your child will read the test in a one to one situation. They will read up to 4 words per page and they will probably do the check in 10-15 minutes. They will be asked to 'sound out' a word and blend the sounds together to read the word. The children have plenty of exposure to nonsense words so they are well prepared for the test.




## Read stories with your child. Relentlessly!

Listen to them reading their reading books. This is them
practising what they are learning in school. If they need
help, that's fine, be positive and encourage them.

Read favourite stories over and over again

 Read some stories at a higher level than they can read themselves. You can practise pronouncing sounds using phonics flashcards. If you do not have any phonics flashcards or sound mats at home please speak to your child's class teacher.


This practises oral blending which is absolutely crucial.
