


Hello!


Reminders

 The book fair will continue to be open after school and will be in the music room.




Reading on Remembrance Day


Books are a great way to help children understand significant historical events as well as kick start conversations and questions about sensitive subjects. The following books are great for children across the school.

Phonics!

From September we have implemented the FFT Success For All Phonics scheme at Dringhouses to support children in becoming accurate, confident and fluent readers and spellers. The programme is delivered to all Reception and Year 1 children and for those pupils in Year 2 and KS2 who need additional support in phonics. 
Name: Beth





Reception Recommended Read:

Tyrannosaurus Drip by Julia Donaldson & David Roberts
Tyrannosaurus Drip, a little peace-loving vegetarian dinosaur, never fits
in with his adopted family of fierce Tyrannosauruses. After putting up
with lots of bullying from the other dinosaurs, Drip runs away to find a
place where he really belongs and soon he finds the inspiration to stand
up to the bullies.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 and 2) Recommended Read:

Troll Stinks! By Jeanne Willis & Tony Ross
This is a great choice of book for exploring the topic of
cyberbullying with younger children. Billy the Goat and his friend
Cyril are playing with a phone when they decide to send mean
messages to the troll living under the bridge. Soon the two friends
discover that their online actions have had a big impact on troll's
feelings and that their messages were not such a fun idea after all.





Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 and 4) Recommended Read:

Max and The Millions by Ross Montgomery

An action-packed adventure, imaginative and heart-warming story about ten-year-old Max who is singled out for being deaf by a despicable Headmaster who is evil enough to rival the Trunchbull. In order to solve a mystery at his boarding school, Max forms a friendship with another boy overcoming their challenges and dispelling some assumptions about deafness along the way.

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 and 6) Recommended Read:

All The Things That Could Go Wrong by Stewart Foster
An absorbing story about bullying and friendship which alternates between
the viewpoints of teenagers Alex and Dan. Daily life is a struggle for Alex,
plagued by worries caused by his OCD and living in fear of the awful
bullying at school. Dan's life is not straightforward either and he plays out
his frustrations at school, messing around in class and finding easy targets
at school to bully with his friends. As time goes by, the boys end up working
together on a raft-building project and a new empathy begins to develop as
their relationship grows.

Children often find an author whose books they really enjoy but once they have finished reading everything that author has to offer they can get a bit lost when it comes to choosing what to read next. 









Letter to be circulated to parents and carers by City of York Council.

Re-visit of City of York Council from 14 November 2022 to 16 November 2022.

Ofsted and the Care Quality Commission (CQC) will carry out jointly a re-visit of your local area following the previous inspection that took place between **09 December 2019 and 13 December 2019.**

The re-visit will evaluate how effectively leaders have addressed the areas of significant weaknesses detailed in the written statement of action (WSOA). The re-visit will be carried out in line with updated guidance about the return to Area SEND inspection, you can read this guidance here.

During the re-visit, Ofsted and CQC inspectors will be keen to speak to as many children and young people and their parents and carers as possible, specifically about the weaknesses identified in the WSOA. These meetings may take place online

How can local children, young people, parents and carers contribute their views during this local area re-visit?

There are several ways in which children, young people, parents and carers can engage with the re-visit process and contribute their views.

The inspectors will gather the contributions of parents and carers through an online survey and a range of other methods.

The survey will open at 12 noon on Monday 07 November 2022 and close at 12 noon on Friday 11 November 2022.

- 3. Parents and carers can contact their local Parent Carer Forum to find out more about about how they can contribute their views during the local area re-visit.



Details about the local area SEND re-visit will be available on your local authority's website and distributed through the local area's Clinical Commissioning Group/s (CCGs).

Information gathered during the re-visit

During this re-visit, inspectors may collect information about children and young people in the area. They may look at local area records, speak to local area officers and leaders at educational settings, and speak to children, young people and parents or carers. No names will be recorded, but some of the information collected may identify a particular child, young person or adult. Ofsted and the CQC will use this information to prepare their re-visit outcomes letter, and for the purposes set out in their privacy notices. No information will be published that identifies any individual in the outcomes letter.

While we recognise that many parents and carers may have views on their experience that extend beyond the focus of the WSOA, we would like parents and carers to understand that the focus of the inspectors during the re-visit will only be the areas of significant weakness identified at the previous inspection. The re-visit team will consider how well leaders have addressed each of the areas of significant weakness detailed in the WSOA. We will not be able to follow up or comment upon individual cases.

Programme (HAF) is holiday provision for school-aged children from reception to year 11 who receive benefits-related free school meals. These holiday activities are available during the Easter, summer, and Christmas school holidays and include a nutritious meal along with a variety of enriching activities.





- We are currently assessing centralised booking systems to bring to our scheme for 2023! This system will be accessible via smart phone or web browser and will provide parents with a simple way to book on one or more of their children. There will be filters for location, age, SEND, and more!
- The planning for the Christmas holiday is well underway! If you have any interest in being a venue or have any other queries, feel free to contact.
- Currently eligibility is being mapped

to determine where there is a greater need for HAF activities. This will include creating catchment areas to try to ensure all families are within walking distance of an activity.



 We aim to include more older young people and will be working with the Youth Council. If you have any interest in championing the HAF programme, please get in touch.

Our summer HAF session engaged with hundreds of children across the city.

- 22 total providers
- Approximately 7,000 places were available to book
- An estimated 1,500 hours of activities
- Our providers covered a wide array of activities, including: arts and crafts; DJ-ing and drama classes; cooking demonstrations; day trips to parks, heritage sites, and fun parks; sports, such as football, rugby, NERF, soft archery, and more; and outdoor activities, such as building dens and campfires.



York City Football Club and York City Knights – two of York's sports teams –

held dozens of activities over the summer, including drop-in play sessions around the city and



St Nicks can be found at the intersection of the Guildhall, Hull Road, and Heworth wards. This summer, they offered spaces for ages 4 – 14 year olds and focused on outdoor activities, including den building, woodland crafts, campfire building and cooking, and more.





New Visuality, held in the Mickelgate ward, focuses on art, but it's much more than that! They took trips to heritage sites, such as Bar Convent (right photo) and local parks, created artworks based on healthy lifestyles, and incorporated active games into their art.
